These fantasies allow her to escape into worlds where she can experience freedom, silence, and independence. The contrast between her real-life constraints and the tranquility of her fantasies underscores her desire for autonomy and a break from being monitored and judged.
- what to do and what not to do. She was really annoyed by these limitations that kept coming up. She did not pay any heed to her mother's constant nagging and was lost in her own thoughts. She believed that she had no freedom to act. She wants total independence from any constraints. She saw herself living the life of a mermaid in a tranquil, emerald sea by herself. She also dreamed of living in a tower like Rapunzel and being alone in peace and quiet with no one to disturb her.

- she wants an independent life and wants to live on her own terms in a tower. Like Rapunzel, Amanda also wants to do whatever she wishes for and not just get instructions all the time from her parents to learn mannerism. Amanda also wants to lead a free life.
- 18. Amanda was overwhelmed by her mother's constant nagging and imagined herself as an orphan, free from parental control. She fantasized about roaming the streets freely, making patterns in the dust with her bare feet, and enjoying the peaceful silence around her. For Amanda, the absence of restrictions symbolized the "golden" silence and the "sweet" taste of freedom.
- and inventive girl who loved freedom and wanted to live alone. She wanted that there were no restrictions and instructions from her mother. She lived between illusions and reality. She wanted to run away or escape from the bitter situations she was facing. She tried various tricks to escape from undesirable situations.

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- Upbringing plays an essential role in a child's development. Poet Robin Klein through this poem Amanda highlights the tension in the 'proper' upbringing of a child. To inculcate good values and moral principles in a growing child is a foremost duty for the parents. However, the poem Amanda shows how a child feels trapped within the cluster of instructions. Amanda is no less than a victim of this travesty; no proper space is given to her creativity. She is instructed for everything. As a result, she feels trapped and seeks an escape. Likewise, some parents are over-protective, they unknowingly kill their child's creativity. They always doubt their child's capability to do things independently. Freedom gives children scope to bloom; hence, it is necessary. Parents should guide and control their children as long as it is necessary. However, over-indulgence will always have a negative impact. Excessive nagging may cause them to become rebellious, and to develop an aversion to actual life.
