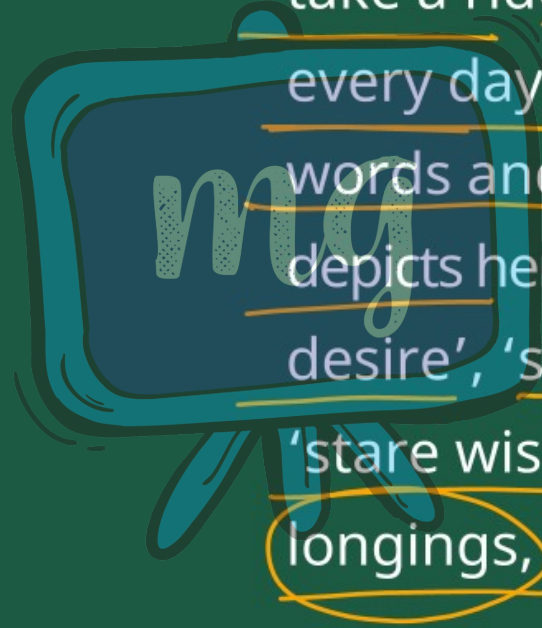

Q.1 What was Valli's deepest desire?

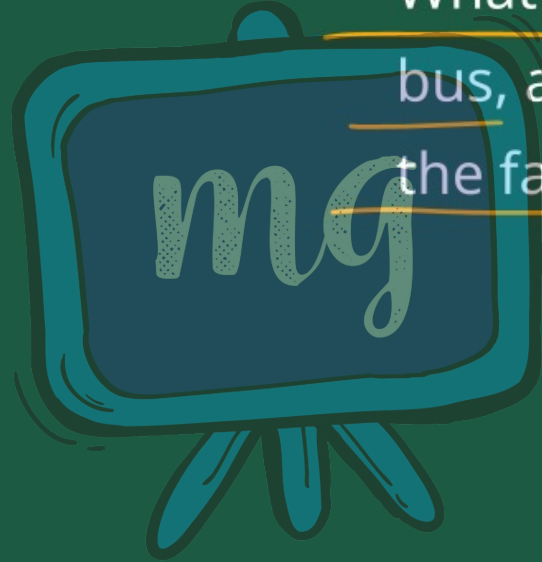

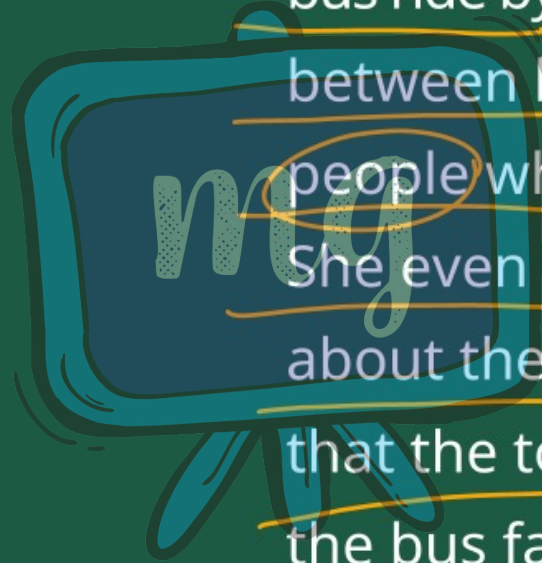

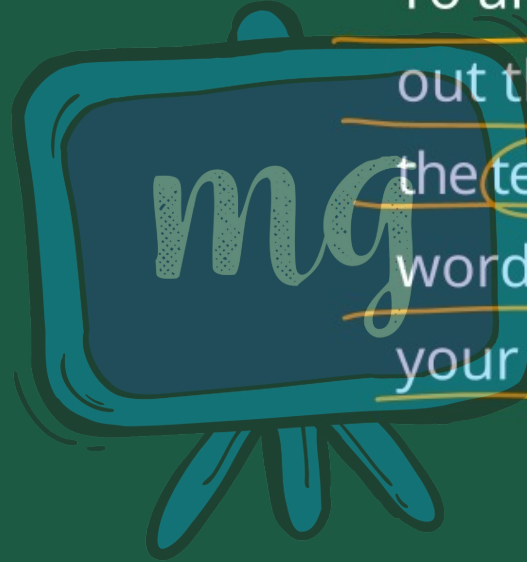


bus and return without getting off,

her parents' knowledge.

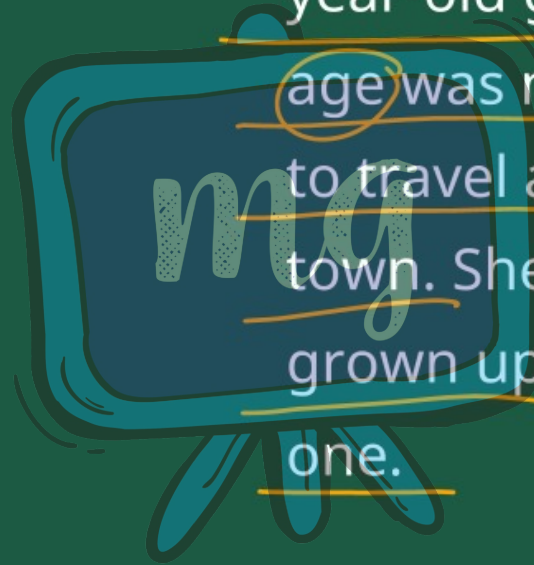

(iv) "Never mind," she said, "I can _____. You don't have to help me. "I'm not a child, I tell you," she said _____.



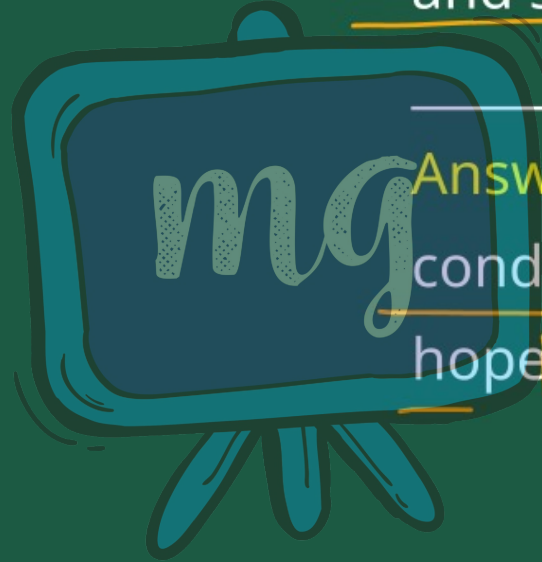
Answer : "Never mind," she said, "I can get on by myself. You don't have to help me. "I'm not a child, I tell you," she said irritably.

hope to see you again."

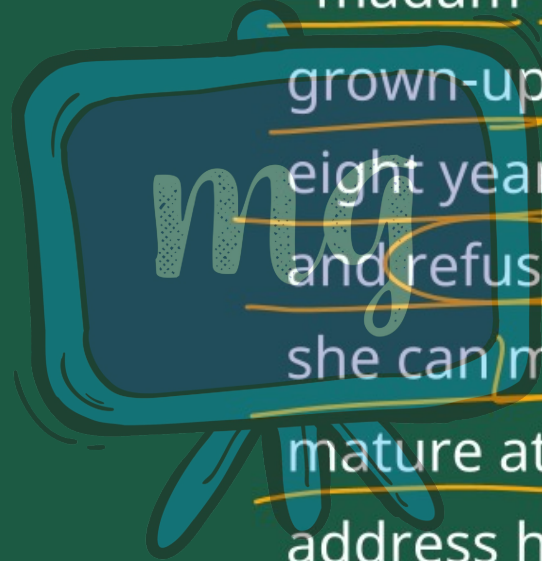
Q.4 Why does the conductor refer to

her ride on the bus.

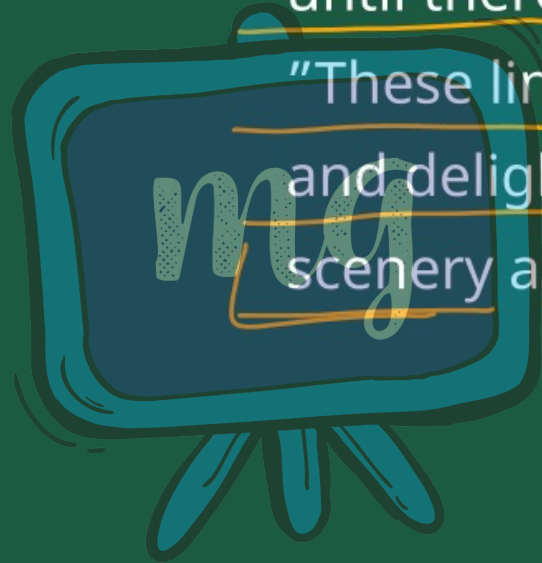

until there were tears in her eyes.

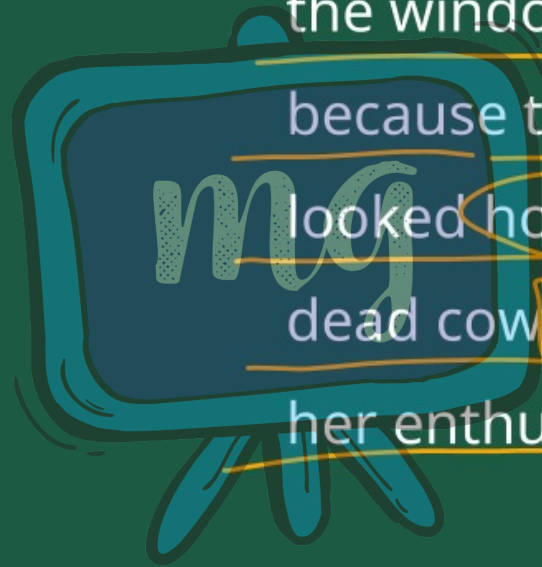

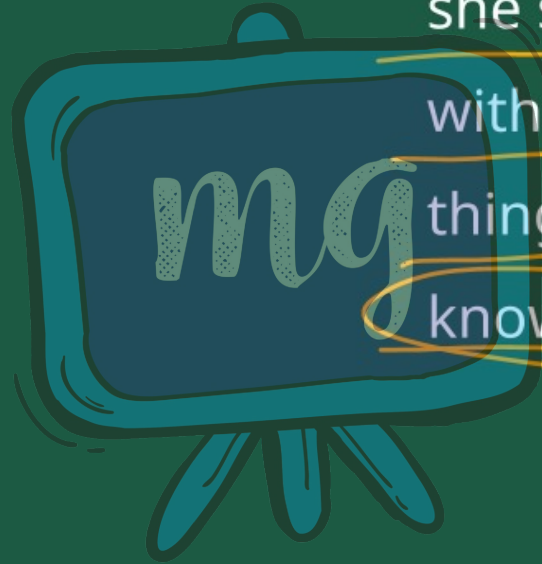
Q.6 Why does Valli refuse to look out
of the window on her way back?



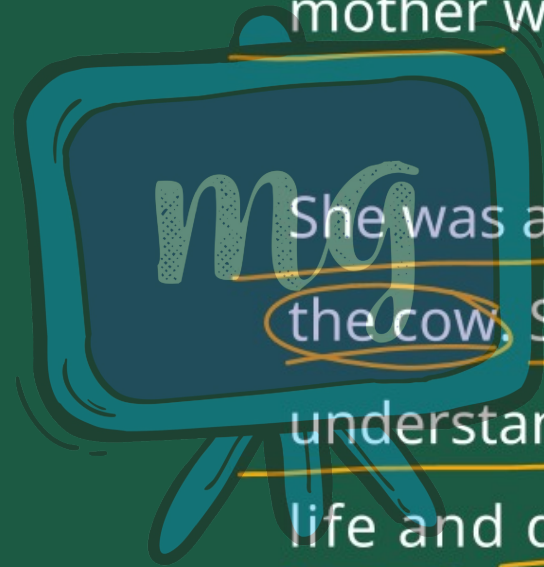
Answer : Valli refuses to look out of

Answer: She meant to say that her mother was ignorant about her.

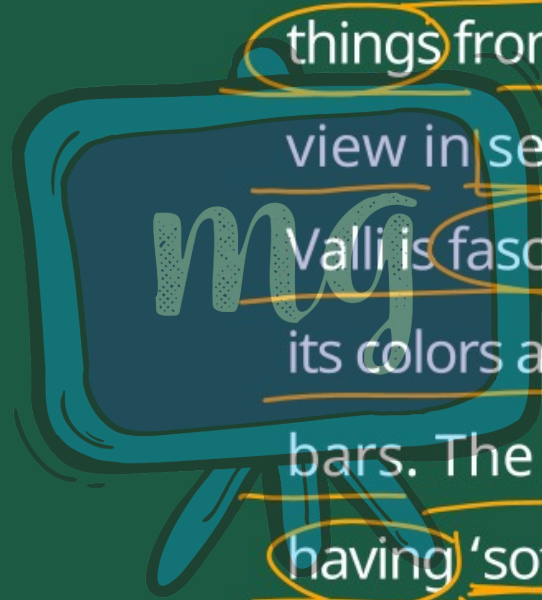


She was also referring the death of the cow. She was now having the understanding about the mystery of life and death apart from the knowledge of it.
